

"Participatory learning and action for community health promotion: the power of theory, methods, and partnerships for advancing public health and health equity"

Biography: Andrew Springer, DrPH is a tenured Associate Professor at UTHealth School of Public Health with 20+ years' experience in designing, implementing, and evaluating health programs for youth and communities in the U.S. and Latin America. His notable work includes the first CDC-guided youth risk behavior survey in El Salvador, NIH-funded research on tobacco prevention, and community health initiatives in underserved areas. A registered health promotion practitioner, he actively contributes to coalitions like Austin/Travis County Community Health Improvement Plan. Andrew specializes in participatory planning, evaluation methods, and contextual health intervention design. He also teaches at Pontificia Universidad Javeriana in Colombia and has received outstanding teaching awards from UTHealth.
